

### What is the Knik Arm Crossing Project?

The Knik Arm Crossing Project is a State of Alaska transportation project to construct a toll bridge and connecting roads between the Municipality of Anchorage and the Matanuska-Susitna Borough. Railroad engineers looking for a more direct route to the northern goldfields first considered a bridge in 1923.

#### The bridge is critical infrastructure

The bridge is an economic engine and will provide for Alaska's growing population through jobs, access to developable land and an improved transportation system for freight and fuel savings statewide.

#### Alaska's population continues to grow

The most recent forecast by the Alaska Department of Labor predicts that the population of Alaska will increase 28 percent by 2035. The fastest area of growth is the Matanuska-Susitna Borough (Mat-Su) and socio-economic forecasts predict that this area will continue to see significant growth over the next 25 years<sup>1</sup>.

#### BRIDGE BENEFITS

- Creates 1,500 jobs each year during construction and 14,000 after opening.
- Constructs a hard link to western Cook Inlet where more than 47 percent of Kenai Borough lands are located.
- Lowers cost of freight to Interior and North Slope — over \$300 million in truck freight savings in first 10 years.
- Establishes a second connection between Anchorage and Mat-Su as an alternative route for emergencies and evacuation.

- Provides access to thousands of acres of land for commercial and residential development.
- Supports the Goose Creek Correctional Center, reducing travel time for workers, suppliers and prisoners.
- Leverages private equity and saves Alaska's federal transportation allocation for other important projects throughout the state.
- Tolls generaté revenue for transportation infrastructure.



Dear Secretary Jewell:

Thank you for meeting with the Resource Development Council (RDC) and Alaska Oil and Gas Association (AOGA) Boards and staff on September 3 during your recent visit to Alaska. We know you are no stranger to our state, but we appreciate you making time during your first visit as Secretary to meet with the resource development community in Alaska.

Alaska is rich in resources, including oil and gas, mining, forestry, fishing and tourism opportunities. As the landowner for just over 60% of our state, a strong working relationship with the Department of Interior (DOI) and the various agencies is crucial in developing these resources in a responsible manner. We strongly agree with your comments about the need to work cooperatively with the DOI, especially those federal employees based here.

To that end, we want to emphasize how important the role Pat Pourchot plays in the DOI and we are hopeful you will be able to fill the Assistant to the Secretary position that is currently vacant in Washington, DC. There is extreme value in these positions for agencies and Alaskans.

We were encouraged by your interest in exploring ways to solidify the Interagency Working Group, not only for future projects in the Arctic but potentially expanding the concept for coordinated permitting in other parts of the state, including Cook Inlet. We will also work with your staff in providing information and ideas to streamline the authorizations needed between the DOI and the Department of Commerce for various species that may follow under various ESA related jurisdictions.

Your mission statement states that the DOI protects America's natural resources and heritage, honors our cultures and tribal communities, and supplies the energy to power our future. While we may not agree on every issue, an open dialogue is vital for success. We look forward to meeting with you again on your next visit to Alaska. Your agencies and staff are welcome to contact either organization at any time for additional feedback and information.

Thank you for making the effort to meet with the Alaska Oil and Gas Association (AOGA) and Resource Development Council for Alaska (RDC) Boards and staff on August 26 during your recent visit to Alaska. AOGA and RDC represent the broad resource development community in Alaska, including oil and gas, mining, forestry, fisheries and tourism industries. EPA's mandate affects all of these industries and the level of AOGA-RDC board participation in our meeting reflects the importance of the EPA related issues facing our organizations.

Our members have a proud record of developing economic opportunities while protecting the clean air and water resources Alaskans cherish. We welcome your emphasis on the need to use defensible sound science, and we agree that the important decisions facing the EPA in Alaska are best served by this data and analysis driven approach.

The issues we discussed including the preemptive as well as retroactive use of the EPA's 404(c) authority; the future regulation of coal, an abundant resource in Alaska; air issues including the small incinerator rule and the one hour NOX standard; and the challenges of your mission with declining revenues, all directly affect the predictability and certainty our members require as they move forward on significant investments in Alaska.

We applaud your willingness to listen to our perspectives and concerns. Because our resource industries underpin the economy of Alaska, the EPA is a critical partner in ensuring a prosperous and healthy future for Alaskans. We look forward to continued dialog with your office and the Region 10 and Alaska staff as we work collectively to find appropriate solutions tailored for the unique challenges presented by Alaska's remoteness and scale.


