




- The ESA defines "species" to include any subspecies and any distinct population segment (DPS) which interbreeds when mature
- A DPS must be discrete from other populations and significant to the species
- Discrete: isolated (may be physically, genetically) from other beluga populations
- Significant: only belugas in Gulf of AK

Population is Decreasing

Trend from 1999 (end of unregulated harvest) to 2008 = -1.45% annually



Conservation under the ESA

What does the listing mean for you?

- Prohibitions "taking"
- Section 7 Consultations federal nexus
- Section 10 permits no federal nexus
- Recovery Planning
- Critical Habitat Development



"Taking" of a listed species is prohibited without authorization (permits)

 "Taking" means to harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, or collect, or to attempt to engage in any such conduct

Federal Consultations – Sec 7

Congress directs Federal agencies to conserve listed species

 ESA requires Federal agencies to consult on the effects of their actions on listed species and critical habitat

When is Sec 7 Consultation Required?

- There is a federal nexus
- Nexus- any action that a Federal agency <u>funds</u>, <u>authorizes or carries out</u> that "may affect" a listed species or critical habitat
- Federal action agency makes this determination
- Effects analysis includes both direct and indirect effects.

Consultation - Steps

- Species List
- Assessment provided by the federal action agency
- No effects no consultation
- "May affect" triggers the consultation
- Informal Consultation
- Formal Consultation
- Potential mitigation
- Take authorizations

Consultation – Federal Actions

Action "may affect" listed species or critical habitat

Action is likely to adversely affect listed species or modify CH

Not likely to adversely affect listed species or modify CH

Formal consultation 135 days

NMFS concurs
Informal consultation concluded

Biological Opinion
Jeopardy or
Adverse modification

Biological Op. No "JAM"

Incidental Take Statement authorizes "take"



- Not likely to adversely affect- effect is discountable, insignificant or beneficial
- Jeopardy- An action cannot jeopardize the continued existence (survival and recovery) of a listed species
- Adverse modification- The action cannot impact the essential features of the habitat to a degree that does not allow for recovery of the species

Section 10 Incidental Take Permits for take

Requested with submission of a Habitat Conservation Plan

Habitat Conservation Plans

- An Incidental Take Permit is required when non-Federal activities will result in "take" of threatened or endangered wildlife.
- A habitat conservation plan (HCP) must accompany an application for an incidental take permit. The purpose of the habitat conservation planning process associated with the permit is to ensure there is adequate minimizing and mitigating of the effects of the authorized incidental take.
- The purpose of the incidental take permit is to authorize the incidental take of a listed species, not to authorize the activities that result in take.



Recovery Plan

ESA requires preparation of a Recovery Plan for CI belugas

Purpose:

- identify threats, present specific actions to conserve the species
- Determine recovery criteria for down/de-listing
- Estimates time and cost to achieve recovery
- Does not mandate actions or provide funds



- The specific areas on which are found those features essential to conservation of the species and which may require special management
- ESA requires CH to be designated at time of listing, or no later than one year from listing if not determinable at the time of listing
- Economic analysis needed cost/benefit
 - Test- do benefits of exclusion outweigh the benefits of inclusion (w/o risking extinction)?

Critical Habitat Designation


- Identify physical and biological features that are essential to the conservation of the species. May include:
 - Space for growth and behavior, food, water etc, cover or shelter, sites for breeding
 - Eg. For CIB these may be things such as prey species, water depth, bottom type, shoreline type, river features


Critical Habitat Designation

Identify areas where features are found

Identify potential exclusions based on economic analysis
